Collecting Evidence for Student Transition Plans Student's Portfolio

A great way to help our students in exiting from high school to adult life is with a student portfolio. This folder can help students keep evidence of what they have accomplished in their transition plan, making it easier to find information when completing a college or job application. When you think of all the documentation that is needed, what better way to help our students, than to have everything they need in one place.

Here are some suggestions that you may want to include (or know where to find) in your Student's Portfolio:

Personal/Employment information – Birth Certificate/Social Security Card/Driver's License (not placed in the folder but know where to find), Health records, names of previous employers and references. Make sure to include all jobs, both paid and unpaid. A copy of the IEP, high school transcript and of course the Summary of Performance.

Assessments & Self-Exploration – Transition assessments, as well as college or vocational entrance exams. Assessments give great information on interests, abilities and skills obtain or needed.

Agency information – A list of agencies that student has or will contact with names and phone numbers and how agencies will assist the student. For those attending college, have contact information on the Disability Services contact information.

Resumes – Students complete a resume with a list of job duties, where and when student worked and what skills, experiences and strengths they have to bring to the job.

Interviews – Information on how to prepare for an interview. Questions that may arise during the interview with student's responses. Have students complete a survey, or as a teacher, complete a rubric on how well the student preformed.

Post-School Options and Preparation/Scholarship and Financial Aid –This section contains information on what students need to reach their post-school outcomes. It can also include scholarship and financial aid information for those students pursuing a college degree. Students can also include all the activities they have accomplished on their transition plan from career, education and daily living/community experiences for evidence of practice.

The Portfolio is a great tool for you and your students to use in reaching their post-school outcomes.

Project SEARCH High School Transition Program

Project SEARCH high school transition program is a unique, business led, one-year, school-to-work program that takes place entirely at the workplace.

The goal for each student participant is competitive employment. The program provides real-life work experience combined with training in employability and independent living skills to help youths with significant disabilities make successful transitions from school to productive adult life. The Project SEARCH model involves an extensive period of training and career exploration, innovative adaptations, long-term job coaching, and continuous feedback from teachers, job coaches, and employers. As a result, at the completion of the training program, students with significant intellectual disabilities are employed nontraditional, complex and rewarding jobs. The presence of a Project SEARCH High School Transition Program can bring about

long-term changes in business culture that have far-reaching positive effects on attitudes about hiring people with disabilities and the range of jobs in which they can be successful.

Alex Livingston obtained employment with Washington

Regional two years through the Fayetteville Project Search program; which is collaborative effort between Fayetteville public school. Lifestyles, and Arkansas Rehabilitation Services. Alex is a PC/LAN Tech in the Information Service Department, Alex is known for his technical skills and abilities to solve complex computer issues. Alex has made a big impression on his coworkers: In 2015 Alex was named Employee of the Year through a system wide vote of Washington Regional Employees.

As employee of the year, Alex received \$2,500; a week paid time off; an engraved clock; gift certificates for dinner and movies; as well as a reserved parking spot throughout 2016. He will also be featured on the Leadership Wall in the hospital lobby.

The Age of Majority Parent Guide & Tip Sheets

The age of majority is the age when children are legally considered adults. In Arkansas, the parent's rights will transfer to their child at the age of 18. This can mean new responsibilities for students! To help prepare for this transfer the National Secondary Transition Technical Assistance Center and National Post-School Outcomes Center developed the Age of Majority Parent Guide & Tip Sheets. Since taking on the rights of an adult can be especially challenging for youth with disabilities, this is a great resource to assist in laying the groundwork for becoming a successful adult. It discusses what the transfer of parental rights means for parents, youth with disabilities, and school systems; competency concerns regarding IDEA; guardianship; and provides tips and connections for parents. Be sure to check it out, use it in the classroom with your students and share it with parents!

Promise Grant Worker ~ Austin-Miller Burns

This summer, the Hot Springs Parks & Trails Department was given the opportunity to participate in the Arkansas Promise Grant program by working with 14-year-old Austin Miller-Burns.

The Promise Grant is a 5-year, \$32 million grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Education to the University of Arkansas and the Arkansas Department of Education. During the summer months, Promise Grant partnered with the Arkansas Workforce Center and their Youth Employment Services Program (YES) to place eligible youth in paid summer work experiences at various worksites in Hot Springs.

Austin expressed an interest in working outside and was excited to be placed at the city's Parks & Trails Department by YES youth coordinator Amanda Stephanus. During his interview with Parks & Trails Director Jean Wallace and Landscape Superintendent Brian Fisher, Austin said he would not let them down and he did not disappoint. Brian later stated, in a nomination letter regarding Austin, that he "has manners, reasoning ability, and a level of maturity that you don't see even in some adults."

In his 2 months with Parks & Trails, Austin experienced a variety of work with the landscape division; including weeding and planting in the downtown Hot Springs flower beds and medians. The heat of the summer months also provided ample opportunity to water, water, and water the public landscape beds around town.

The desire to work hard and learn from Brian's instruction paid off this summer as Austin was awarded the Outstanding Youth Award and received an iPad mini at the Recognition Ceremony on August 18, 2016.

Setting Goals for the New Year - Make working with ATS one of YOUR goals!

As we start a new calendar year and look back on the previous one, it's a great time to think about setting goals, whether those goals be personal or professional. We think it's a great time to look at the transition program within your school or district and possibly set some new goals for improvements. If you don't meet or have contact with your transition consultant, we hope that you will consider doing just that. There are so many things we can provide that go beyond making sure your transition plans are compliant. Of course, we do want to make sure your transition plans are compliant so we can report 100% compliance for Indicator 13, but ultimately, we want to make sure you have meaningful plans that help students reach their post-school goals. (if you are wondering what Indicator 13 is, you definitely need to contact your Transition Consultant!) Making improvements in your transition program doesn't just mean planning activities for your students—it's also about educators and IEP teams participating in activities. Though we have lots of ideas on ways to work with your students in transition, most of what we do is work directly with educators and agencies. We want to work more with you!

Consider asking us about just one of these opportunities as we begin the new year:

- Regularly scheduled school visits: We're happy to schedule monthly, quarterly, or whatever, meetings to keep teachers updated, review files, or share the many tools on our website—the possibilities are limitless, and it's a great way to stay connected!
- Assessment overview: An opportunity to review transition assessments and discuss development of a transition assessment timeline.
- Assessment of implementation of predictors of in-school/post-school success: A great opportunity to look at what predictors are currently in place at your school and where there is a need for more!
- Indicator 13 checklist: This can be done as a refresher or for the new teacher, but it breaks down all the components of a compliant transition plan and provides a handy checklist for the teachers. This can also be incorporated into a file review—great to do annually and definitely in preparation of monitoring!
- Goal writing and Activities: Let us show your teachers how to write appropriate measurable goals that have meaningful activities to go along with them!
- Department/LEA meeting attendance: Invite us to regularly attend your school's special education department
 meetings to highlight a variety of topics throughout the year—we can do the same at area LEA Supervisor
 meetings!
- Self-Determination overview: ATS can provide an overview specifically of self-determination, as well as tools and resources to provide assessment and implementation of self-determination curriculum.
- Transition Fair planning: Don't let another year go by without holding a transition fair in your district—or holding the same old, same old with poor turnout and hum-drum content! Talk to your transition consultant about some innovative ways to make your transition fair the best it can be!
