This notice is to let you know that your son/daughter will be participating in self-determination

Self-determination

refers to both the right and the ability to direct your own life.

Self-determination

allows people to make choices and decisions to improve their quality of life.

Self-determination means:

- knowing yourself;
- knowing what you want your future to look like and how to plan for it; and
- knowing the supports you will need to have control in your life.

■Parents should know:

studies show that students who included self-determination goals in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) were more likely to earn a higher income one year after graduation. (Wehmeyer, 2004)

■How can you help your child become self-determined?

- Encourage your child to make choices and decisions about everyday activities.
- Help your child to understand that choices have results and consequences.
- Talk to your child about the process of goal setting.
- Encourage disability awareness.
- Help your child to understand accommodations and the role they play in his/her life.
- Talk to your child about his/her rights.
- Help your child to become involved in his/her IEP.
- Model problem solving.
